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ROSA OMS Home Care Report for South Australia 2023

On behalf of the Registry of Senior Australians (ROSA), we are delighted to provide the inaugural ROSA Outcome Monitoring System (OMS) Home Care Report for South Australia 2023. The ROSA OMS Home Care Report is a significant milestone and Australian first, providing comprehensive and unbiased quality and safety monitoring reports of home care services in Australia.

This brief report describes the quality and safety of care received by 3,327 home care package recipients in South Australia enrolled in ROSA in 2019. Since August 2018, ROSA has enrolled individuals in South Australia who had an aged care eligibility assessment ('ACAT'). In 2019, the ROSA captured 31.4% of home care package recipients in South Australia. By 2023, most home care package recipients will be enrolled.

ROSA is a Clinical Quality Registry¹ established in 2017, designed to monitor and evaluate health, service use, medication use, mortality, and other key outcomes of people receiving aged care services. ROSA is supported by a partnership of institutions committed to improving the quality of aged care services, including aged care industry partners (ECH Inc, Silverchain, Life Care), universities (University of Adelaide, University of South Australia, and Flinders University), a consumer health advocacy group (COTA SA), South Australian Health and Medical Research Institute (SAHMRI), SA NT DataLink, and SA Health. Since its establishment, the ROSA team have delivered high-quality evidence to support and improve the aged care sector in key areas that impact the wellbeing of older Australians. During the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety (2019-2021), ROSA made significant contributions to the investigations into quality and safety nationally, specifically within the area of measurement and monitoring.

The ROSA OMS is a pragmatic and low burden monitoring and benchmarking system to support evidence-based quality and safety improvements through the delivery of important information to aged care providers. The ROSA OMS was built from collaboration with the ROSA team, aged care providers (ECH Inc, Silverchain, Life Care), peak body (Aged & Community Care Providers Association), other industry representatives (SA Innovation Hub), clinicians and professional associations (Australian Medical Association, Australian Nursing and Midwifery Federation SA Branch), and consumer representatives.

The ROSA OMS reports on 15 quality and safety indicators for home care packages providers.² The indicators are: antipsychotic use, chronic opioid use, exposure to high sedative load, antibiotic use, fall-related hospitalisations, fractures, premature mortality, medication-related hospitalisations, weight loss or malnutrition-related hospitalisations, delirium or dementia-related hospitalisations, emergency department presentations, pressure injury-related hospitalisations, utilisation of chronic disease management plans, home medicines reviews and wait-time for services.

Importantly, the ROSA OMS uses integrated national and state-based data sources for its report. Specifically, the data sources are: 1) Australian Institute of Health and Welfare's National Aged Care Data Clearinghouse, 2) Medicare Benefits Schedule, 3) Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme, 4) National Death Index, 5) State Admitted Hospitalisation Records, and 6) State Emergency Department Records. The use of these data sources and risk adjustment of the indicators distinguishes the ROSA OMS from other quality monitoring programs in Australia.

ROSA OMS Home Care Report Summary for South Australia

There were 3,327 home care package recipients receiving care from 68 providers in South Australia enrolled in the ROSA in 2019. The median age of this cohort was 84 years old, 66.5% were women, and 18% had a diagnosis of dementia.

MEDICATION-RELATED INDICATORS



6.6% used an antipsychotic



29.0% experienced a high sedative load



15.4% had chronic opioid use



52.1% used an antibiotic

HOSPITALISATION OR MORTALITY-RELATED INDICATORS



18.2% had at least one **fall** requiring hospitalisation



4.0% had a hospitalisation involving malnutrition or weight loss



8.8% had at least one **fracture** requiring hospitalisation



11.3% of the people living with dementia were hospitalised for delirium or dementia



0.6% had premature mortality



47.9% had an emergency department presentation



1.1% were hospitalised for a **medication-related event**



3.9% had a hospitalisation involving a **pressure injury**

SERVICE-RELATED INDICATORS



41.2% received a chronic disease management plan



3.1% had a home medicines review



60.3% waited more than 6 months from an aged care eligibility assessment (ACAT) approval to commencement of home care episode
